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LEGACY Bill Introduced to Provide Housing for Grandfamilies

Demonstrating support for the work of more than 2 million grandparents and other relatives raising children in America, today Senators Mary Landrieu (D-LA), Mike DeWine (R-OH) and Debbie Stabenow (D-MI) introduced LEGACY, a bill to improve access to housing for "grandfamilies" across the United States.

"We applaud Senators Landrieu, DeWine and Stabenow for their outstanding leadership on behalf of grandparents and other relatives raising children," said Donna Butts, executive director of Generations United, "The LEGACY Act is one great step toward helping to support the hard work of these caregivers who are keeping families together while saving billions of taxpayer dollars by keeping children out of the foster care system."

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, 2.1 million children are being raised by grandparents or other relatives with no parents present. These children come into the care of their grandparent or relatives for a variety of reasons including parental substance abuse, child abuse and/or neglect, poverty, mental health problems, incarceration, and death of a parent. These caregivers conservatively save taxpayers \$4.5 billion per year by keeping these children out of the formal foster care system. Many of these grandparents are prepared for retirement, but not for raising a second family. They take on this responsibility at great personal expense and often with little to no support.

The need for safe and affordable housing ranks high among the challenges facing these families. Unfortunately the nation's housing policies have not kept pace with the unique needs of the growing number of grandfamilies across the nation. As a result some grandparents, living in senior-only housing have been forced to keep these children inside fearing eviction if the children are discovered. Others are living in overcrowded conditions.

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The LEGACY Act was inspired by the Academy Award®-nominated documentary film, *LEGACY*, which follows an inner city Chicago family for five years as the family struggles to overcome the senseless loss of a young family member and leave the public housing projects. Because of a strong grandmother who helps raise several grandchildren and an anonymous gift for a down payment on a house, the family is eventually able to move into their own home and start promising new lives. The film has been used as an outreach tool to educate communities and families about issues affecting grandparents and other relative caregivers and legislation like LEGACY that can assist these families.

The bill, **LEGACY -- Living Equitably: Grandparents Aiding Children and Youth** will assist grandfamilies by creating national demonstration projects within HUD's Section 202 and Section 8 programs to develop housing specifically for grandparents and other relatives raising children; provide access to fair housing funds for education and outreach effort about the legal issue surrounding these families; provide specialized training to HUD personnel focused on grandparent- and other relative-headed families; and clarify that grandparents are eligible for family unification assistance.
